INTERIM REPORT ON THE DIOCESE OF OAKLAND MISSION ALIGNMENT PROCESS (MAP)

INTRODUCTION

The Catholic Church has been experiencing lower Mass attendance in the United States since the 1950s. <u>Gallup reports</u> that in 1955, 75% of Catholics attended Mass weekly. In 2014-2017 US Mass attendance shrank to 39%. According to the <u>Center for Applied</u> Research in the <u>Apostolate</u>, since the pandemic the number of Catholics who say they attend Mass every week has dropped to 17%. Those who say they never attend went from 18% to 29% (a 62% change). Gallup attributes the drop in Mass attendance to an increase in lack of religious affiliation, which is shown in recent <u>Pew surveys</u>. The latest Mass attendance numbers for the Diocese of Oakland show a drop of 42% from 2019 to 2021 due to the COVID pandemic.

Like many other places in the US, the Oakland diocese has seen an overall decrease in the number of priests to serve our parishes. We currently are serving our parishes with 25% fewer priests than in 1985. The number of parishes has gone down only slightly, but we are serving these parishes with far fewer priests. Many of our parishes struggle to make ends meet financially.

BISHOP'S RESPONSE

In November 2000 Bishop Michael C. Barber, SJ made known his intention to form a task force to evaluate how to best continue to serve our people as we face the challenges mentioned above. In January 2021 Chancellor Steve Wilcox, Chief Financial Officer Paul Bongiovanni, and Vicar General Fr. Lawrence D'Anjou began the work of forming the Mission Alignment Process (MAP) commission. Priests of the diocese were invited to recommend names of qualified persons from their parishes to serve on this commission. At the Chrism Mass on March 25, 2021, Bishop Barber announced the members of the MAP commission. It was constituted of clergy and laity, men and women, representing the major ethnicities and constituents of the diocese. Some commission members are among those recommended by the priests. See appendix 1 for these members of the MAP commission.


Bishop Barber has shared his priorities for Oakland diocese parishes: "Our Diocese is a place of prayer where we: 1. Emphasize the Sunday experience of the Holy Eucharist; 2. Practice the corporal and spiritual works of mercy; and 3. Form missionary disciples." The goal of the MAP commission from its inception has been to keep these priorities in focus as the work of the commission is carried out.

MAP COMMISSION WORK

The MAP commission began its first meeting with Bishop Barber presiding at Holy Mass on April 16, 2021 . He joined the meeting which took place at the Cathedral events center. The commission met regularly during the ensuing months to gather and study data from our parishes, schools, and parish demographics, and was informed about canonical matters related to the process. During this time Fr. D'Anjou was in consultation with representatives of other dioceses who had gone through similar efforts. Our diocese became the beneficiary of free advice and survey services through a joint program with the Lilly Foundation and Catholic Leadership Institute (CLI)


The priests of the Oakland diocese were introduced to the MAP at in-person and online meetings on July 28-29, 2021. They were informed of the MAP commission's work and of plans for upcoming online surveys for priests and parishioners through CLI. These surveys were conducted between October and December 2021. All parishes and priests participated in the surveys.

In the first quarter of 2022 the commission looked closely at the data from the parish and priest surveys. They developed a presentation which included graphs of the dramatic decline in Mass attendance, priests in parish service, and future projections of priests moving into their retirement years as seen below. Other data shared included historical and present Mass attendance, sacraments, and other information reported from the parishes and schools. A condensation of this data showing attendance counts is in appendix 2.




Total Pastors, Parochial Administrators & Parochial Vicars by Year

CONSULTATIONS BEGIN

The data mentioned above was shared with the Oakland clergy on March 17, 2022. The priests were asked to give us feedback on their observed trends and takeaways. These are provided in appendix 3.

The commission then invited pastors to invite five parish leaders to join them for regional meetings in May 2022. At these meetings clergy and lay participants were presented with the same data. Their observations on trends and takeaways are in appendix 4.

In May and June, 2022 another round of MAP consultation meetings was held, this time at the deanery level. The invitees included the parish clergy, the initial five parish leaders from the regional meetings and an additional five parish leaders chosen by the pastor. These participants were provided with the same data as well as an explanation of different models of parish collaboration, specifically the cluster, merger, and closure models. The explanation of these models and their feedback is provided in appendix 5.

At the publication of this interim report (September 2022) another round of consultation will take place with the priests of each deanery and Bishop Barber. These will be considered, and recommendations will be shared for parish input before any final decisions are made.

Bishop Barber, the MAP commission, and our priests understand that changes at the parish level such as a cluster, merger, or closure are very challenging and emotional events. They must be carried out with professionalism, sensitivity, care, and much consultation. The Oakland diocese has done this successfully in the past. Parish communities which have undergone these changes often report, although the process was difficult, they have a more vibrant parish community as a result.

MOVING TOWARD IMPLEMENTATION

From the beginning the MAP commission's focus has been to revitalize our parishes following Bishop Barber's parish priorities mentioned above. Much needs to be done before realignment of parishes is implemented. This process is anticipated to begin in 2023. The MAP commission is working to create support teams to assist pastors, parish leadership and parishioners both from an administrative level and mission-focus level. With sensitivity, care, consultation, and a focus on our mission we aspire to help make each Oakland diocese parish a vibrant and fully functional Catholic community.

Attendance:

Significant decreases in Mass attendance with wide variances within some deaneries.

Attendance has not recovered as much in less diverse parishes.

Large drop since COVID; what's long-term impact and will they return?

During pandemic started livestream attendance; comfort for parishioners for online Masses.

Lower Mass attendance leads to decrease in collections.

Large number of Masses vs. seating capacity and attendance.

Clergy:

Clergy morale is low and priests are isolated from each other.

Too few priests with too many Masses causing burnout.

Number of priests going down and decline in native born vocations.

Data:

Data is confusing and it is a mistake to use data collected during COVID.

Some data may be inflated or deflated.

Demographics:

Parishes reflect the economic situation of people; inner city vs. suburbs.

People are getting older and the elderly communities are declining.

Decline in religious affiliation.

Evenly split between green, yellow and red parishes.

Some parishes rich in spirit and sacraments are financially struggling.

REGIONAL MEETING FORMAT AND AGENDA

Format

A PowerPoint was used to present the information by two co-presenters, members of the MAP Commission. Bishop Barber was present at all five regional meetings and made remarks at the end of each meeting.

Attendees were welcomed by MAP members and assigned to tables in order to encourage dialogue about the information presented from a wider, diocesan perspective. After the presentation, which provided an orientation about MAP's work to date and statistics about declining Mass attendance and declining numbers and increasing ages of priests serving in the diocese, participants were given a Key Indicators report that provided information about each parish organized by parish within deaneries and regions. The diocese has 81 parishes in 14 deaneries in five regions.

MAP identified four key parish indicators taken from data submitted by each parish to the chancery from the October Mass Counts, Parish Profiles or Financial Reports:

- Mass Attendance (5-yr average for the years 2015-2019; actual counts for 2019 and 2021; the number of weekend Masses; the number of Masses held in a language other than English or based on culture; and the seating capacity of the church)
- <u>Sacraments</u> (2021 counts for the number of baptisms ages 0-6 years old; children receiving First Communion; Confirmation for youth ages 10-17 years old; and adults receiving the sacraments of Christian Initiation, Full Communion, Full Initiation and Confirmation)
- Finances (A blended color-coded score of green = good, yellow = average and red = poor. Scores were based on combining weighted scores for 5-yr average plate income for the years 2015-2019 (20%); average plate growth rate for the 5-years 2015-2019 (15%); 5-yr average surplus or deficit for the years 2015-2019 (30%); net cash on hand as of June 2021 (5%); and number of days of cash on hand as of June 2021 (30%))
- <u>Elementary Schools</u> (WCEA Catholic Identity rating from every 6-yr accreditation process; STAR academic achievement reading and math index scores for 2nd 8th grade students in one academic year; and financial benchmark scores of Tier 1 = red (concerns), Tier 2 = yellow (needs support) and Tier 3 = green (healthy). Scores use 14 metrics with points for each based on enrollment, balance sheets and income statements).

Since all but the clergy were seeing this information for the first time, each column was explained in detail and attendees were reminded that the Key Indicators report provided sensitive information and was not to be used to compare or to judge parishes or priests. MAP asked them to take a realistic look at the key data for analysis and feedback. Key Indicator reports were collected at the end of each meeting.

In round one, participants were asked to quietly review the data and individually write down what trends were evident and what they see as the key takeaways. In round two, the participants were asked to share their observations with others at their table and have a recorder write down the trends and takeaways from the table discussion to share with the wider group attending their regional meeting.

Observations and table reports about the deaneries, regions and diocese were consistent at every regional meeting. The table reports for the trends and takeaways are not summarized by region but reported as a summary recap.

At all of the regional meetings, participants said that this important data should be made available in the future on an on-going basis to all the parishes so they will be aware of the situation in their parishes and the diocese. There was also considerable feedback that additional data was needed especially more current sacramental counts. As a result, a 2021 Supplemental Sacraments report was compiled that included 2019 and 2021 counts and 5-year averages for the years 2015-2019 for the sacraments listed in the Key Indicators Report. This supplemental report along with the Key Indicators Report was provided to participants at the 14 deanery meetings held in May and June.

MAP Attendance for Administrative Support: Mary Fair and Devereaux Smith

Attendance:

- This deanery has six parishes. 25 of the 55 present attended the Region 1 meeting.
- Since Our Lady of Lourdes is clustered with Christ the Light and a deacon administers St Patrick, there are only two diocesan pastors and one OMI pastor, who were all present. Deacon Rigo Cabezas and Fr Jim Schexnayder were also present.
- This deanery has no elementary schools but Rodney Pierre-Antoine was present from Lumen Christi Academies.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- With the exception of the Cathedral (1,308), this deanery has low 5-year average attendance all under 500 (St Patrick 223, Sacred Heart at 211, St Columba at 396 and Our Lady of Lourdes at 443).
- Their total 5-year average (2015-2019) is 2,581 and their total attendance in 2019 was 2,433 and 2021 was 1,482, which is 61% of their 2019 attendance.
- They have 16 Masses with three of those in languages other than English plus St Columba's African American Mass. .
- Financially, only Sacred Heart, managed by OMI priests is in the green primarily because of rental income from a charter school. Christ the Light and Our Lady of Lourdes are yellow and St

- Columba and St Patrick are red.
- There are no elementary schools in Deanery 1.

Structural Collaborations:

- Of the seven table groups, the common thread was clusters were better than mergers.
- If any parishes were to be clustered it should be the four (Our Lady of Lourdes + Sacred Heart + St Columba + St Patrick) not including the cathedral since it is so different.
- They all realized that some parishes in their deanery probably had to close eventually.
- St Columba stressed their strong African American identity that they did not want to lose or dilute.
- One table suggested that this process should be like dating: starting slow, getting to know each other, going out to lunch, longer dates, and slowly building up to a relationship and commitment.

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- Deanery is not active and has not been functioning well.
- Will MAP listen well at deanery meetings and take parishes' comments into consideration when making recommendations?
- How manage collaborations with order run parishes in deaneries?
- How is MAP defining "vibrant" parishes as it may be different in each ethnically diverse parish?

- Get to know the parishes locally and develop a functional deanery before any clusters or mergers which will help to diffuse angry and upset parishioners.
- Act with social justice which is important for their diverse and multi-cultural demographics including many struggling or marginalized parishioners.
- Consider how the boundaries are defined and who should be in this deanery.
- Identify and address the root causes of the decline in attendance.
- Utilize lay leadership especially in parish administration to free priests to focus on
 pastoral duties, leadership must include women, who one table suggested would
 "fix this problem within a few months." Acknowledge that having one order run
 parish complicates things if parishes are clustered or merged.
- Conduct a SWOT analysis at each parish to identify their strengths and weaknesses before considering different structural collaborations.
- Utilize property assets to generate income for this deanery (ground lease/land lease).
- Evangelize and use ALPHA model to invite potential Catholics.
- Reduce and coordinate the number of Masses to help better utilize resources human and physical.

MAP Attendance for Administrative Support: Fr Leo Edgerly, Jr., Mary Fair, Jocelyn Pierre-Antoine and Devereaux Smith. Fr Jayson Landeza arrived during the table discussions after an Oakland Black pastors' meeting.

Attendance:

- This is a smaller deanery with four parishes. It was the most well-attended in terms of number registered, and 20 of those present also attended the Region 1 meeting.
- All their pastors/parochial administrators (PAs) attended.
- This deanery has three elementary schools and all three principals were present.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- This deanery does not have large attendance counts. Corpus Christi has the highest 5-yr average of 657 and St Leo the lowest at 260.
- Their combined attendance is lower than many of the parishes in the diocese with a total 5-year average attendance of 1,916 which dropped to 1,115 in 2021 or 58.2% of 2019 attendance.
- They have 15 Masses and St Margaret Mary offers a Latin Mass and St Leo a Cantonese Mass.
- Financially, Corpus Christi is red, St Leo and St Margaret Mary are yellow and St Theresa is green.
- Their three schools are WCEA rated "highly effective" and their index and financial scores are high at Corpus Christi (green Tier 3) and St Theresa (green Tier 3) with St Leo (yellow Tier 2).

Structural Collaborations:

Of the five table groups, four suggested possible clusters. () indicates the number of tables suggesting a similar collaboration:

- St Leo + Sacred Heart (2)
- St Leo + St Augustine
- St Theresa + Corpus Christi
- St Margaret Mary with another parish they did not identify.
- Table 4 suggested a potential closure of St Leo.

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- Not enough data to make recommendations and simple numbers do not provide context to make decisions
- Two tables said closures were "out of the question" or not to be considered.
- Schools should be factored into the decision-making.
- Mergers were not appropriate because of their highly effective schools and each parish's unique liturgical "branding."
- All faith traditions have lower attendance and the speaker wondered what Jesus would tell the apostles today to do in the diocese's situation.
- What is the diocese's "hard number goal?"

Ideas and Recommendations:

- Create a hybrid model for the schools by having separate K-5 and middle schools which would also open the opportunity to bring in more families, evangelize and strengthen the schools.
- Cluster and consolidate support services at the deanery level (administration, education/formation, and youth ministry).
- Share best practices so there is consistency in formation programs.
- Build community before cluster or closure.
- "Lift up" struggling parishes like St Leo by stronger, healthier parishes helping weaker parishes.
- Take responsibility Each parishioner has to take responsibility; "up to us to make things happen."

MAP Attendance for Administrative Support: Fr Brandon Macadaeg, Fr Jimmy Macalinao, Fr Jayson Landeza, Fr Mark Ruiz, Paul Bongiovanni, Rick Medeiros, Jocelyn Pierre-Antoine and Devereaux Smith. Translation services and devices were provided for Spanish speakers.

Attendance:

- This is a larger deanery with seven parishes. St Anthony-Mary Help of Christians, St Bernard, St Jarlath and St Louis Bertrand were not as well represented at this meeting as the other three parishes. However, 30 of the 47 present had attended the Region 1 meeting.
- The pastors or clergy representatives did not attend from St Anthony-Mary Help of Christians and St Louis Bertrand. All the other pastors/PAs attended.
- This deanery has two Lumen Christi elementary schools and neither of the principals were present but Rodney Pierre-Antoine, Lumen Christi Academies Executive Director attended.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- This deanery has strong Mass attendance counts. Five of the seven parishes have 5-year average attendance over 1,200 with St Elizabeth's attendance of 2,886. St Bernard's 5-year average was 950 and St Benedict's was 272.
- The deanery's total attendance was 8,752 in 2019 and dropped to 6,221 in 2021 or 71.1% of 2019 attendance.
- They have 42 Masses each weekend and 24 of those are in languages other than English with St Benedict celebrating an African American liturgy each weekend.
- Financially, none are green, three are yellow (Divine Mercy, St Bernard and St Louis Bertrand) and four are red (St Anthony-MHC, St Benedict, St Elizabeth and St Jarlath.
- They have two Lumen Christi Academies both rated "highly effective" with red Tier 1 financial rankings, consistent with the financial scores of the parishes on which grounds the schools are located.

Structural Collaborations:

There were seven English-speaking and one Spanish-speaking table for the mixed- parish round 2 discussions.

- One table suggested clustering stronger parishes with a green/good or yellow/average financial ranking with struggling parishes with a red/poor financial ranking.
- A majority of the tables were willing to suggest clusters of parishes. () indicates the number of tables suggesting a similar collaboration.
 - St Elizabeth + St Jarlath + St Anthony-Mary Help of Christians (2)
 - St Elizabeth + St Jarlath (3)
 - St Louis Bertrand + St Bernard (3)
 - St Benedict + Divine Mercy (2)

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- Be sensitive to the cultural and ethnic makeup of these parishes.
- It is important to maintain the identify of each parish community.
- Consider geography when considering clusters.
- Diocese should not consider any closures.
- May lose parishioners with different Mass times and increased distance to get to Mass.
- Will there be good leadership if parishes are clustered?
- How many priests would be assigned to a clustered parish?

Ideas and Recommendations:

- Create "central faith formation centers" to make sure we have consistent teaching and practices in the diocese which may avoid "shopping around" for faith formation or sacramental prep programs.
- Involve parishioners in the transition process.
- Communicate often with consistent, informed, and clear messaging.
- Encourage parishioners to return to a stronger cluster of parishes.

MAP Attendance for Administrative Support: Paul Bongiovanni, with help from Carlos de Quesada and Dan Flannagan from VeraCruz Advisory

Attendance:

- This is the smallest deanery and attendance was good except for St Philip St Albert who only sent six of the 12 people registered. 11 of the 28 present attended the Region 1 meeting.
- All three pastors/PAs attended.
- This deanery has two elementary schools and one high school and all the principals attended.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- This deanery has three parishes all located on the island of Alameda. 5-year average attendance totaled 2,558 and average counts in 2019 were 2,420 and 1,405 in 2021 or 58.1% of 2019 attendance.
- St Joseph Basilica has the highest 5-year average attendance of 1,274, followed by St Philip-St Albert at 727 and St Barnabas at 557.
- Financially, St Philip-St Albert is ranked green, St Joseph Basilica is yellow and St Barnabas is red.
- They have two elementary schools both rated "highly effective" and ranked in the green Tier 3.

Structural Collaborations:

There were five mixed parish tables. Some structural collaborations were suggested:

- Close St. Albert since this is an underutilized asset. (This was mentioned by two of the five small groups).
- Cluster or merge St. Joseph + St. Barnabas for financial viability since both parishes are only at 50% seating capacity. (Two other groups had this same suggestion. One group wanted a one-year grace period before this merger takes place. The other group prefers a merger rather than a cluster of these two parishes.)
- Cluster the entire deanery. This may provide growth from the programmatic standpoint.
- It is vital to keep St. Barnabas open as a church due to the growth on that side of the island.

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- Why aren't financially ranked green parishes helping the yellow and red parishes?
- Diocesan assessments should only be taken from financially ranked green parishes.
- What has the diocese done to help parishes during COVID? If the diocese did help, what worked and what did not work?
- What is being done to recruit future priests, especially from other countries? (i.e., missionary priests)
- What will happen to the order of priests at St. Philip Neri-St. Albert if there is an additional cluster or merger? We may end up losing more order priests.
- Sacraments provide skewed data since a place like St. Barnabas focuses on senior housing so there are not as many people receiving Baptism, 1st Communion, and Confirmation.

Ideas and Recommendations:

- Supply more demographic data about the growth taking place on the West End and Alameda Point.
- Have more discussion on the "Why."
- Collaborate throughout the deanery. (i.e., faith formation for all ages) This was looked at 20-years ago but nothing took place.
- Provide an incentive for any parishes that merge or cluster (i.e., reduce diocesan assessment).
- Allow St. Barnabas to keep its identity because young people are more involved (i.e., young people are ushers at Mass) and they have so much outreach and are proud of what they do.
- Create a culture of a Church that supports a feeling of belonging and that people want to
 contribute to this culture. When young people are involved and there is a feeling of belonging,
 the Spirit comes into the soul.
- Adjust diocesan assessment for social equity (i.e., red parishes do not pay an assessment, yellow parishes pay an adjusted assessment, and green parishes have a more progressive assessment to pay).

MAP Attendance for Administrative Support: Rick Medeiros and Mary Fair. Due to a conflict, we were not able to provide a translator, but Fr Alberto Perez, who is bi-lingual, hosted the Spanish-speakers during the table discussions.

Attendance:

- This deanery has five parishes, four of which are located in Berkeley plus St Augustine in Oakland. It was well attended and 20 of the 50 present attended the Region 1 meeting.
- Of the 12 parish adds: three were for St Joseph the Worker, who had only registered five for the regional meeting and not submitted additional names for the deanery meeting; four from St Mary Magdalen and four from Holy Spirt, including the priest and one from St Ambrose.
- All of the pastors or PAs were in attendance except the pastor, Fr Ivan Tou, CSP, who was attending his Paulist's community meeting. He sent Fr Kenneth Boyack, CSP to represent Holy Spirit-Newman Center.
- This deanery has one elementary school and the principal did not attend but sent a representative. Dr Andrew Currier from the Department of Catholic Schools attended.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- Holy Spirit is different from the rest of the parishes in this deanery. It is run by the Paulists, includes a Newman Center, has a yellow blended financial score and the highest Mass attendance (5-yr average = 1,104, 2019 = 1,018, and 2021 = 483).
- The other four parishes have red financial scores and Mass attendance under 500 in 2019, which dropped to under 220 in 2021 (low of 126 at St Augustine and a high of 215 at St Ambrose).
- The deanery's total 5-yr average Mass attendance including Holy Spirit-Newman Center was only 2,766, and attendance in 2019 was 2,515 and their 2021 attendance was 1,175 or 46.7% of 2019 attendance.
- As reported in 2020 to the Consultors and Presbyterial Council, their combined 2019 total attendance was lower than 10 individual parishes in the diocese and had decreased 36.5%
- St Mary Magdalene has a school ranked WCEA "highly effective" with a green Tier 3 financial score.

Structural Collaborations:

There were six mixed table groups including one-Spanish speaking (parishioners from St Ambrose and St Joseph the Worker).

- Each person felt their own parish was very important making a merger or closure difficult to accept, since larger is not necessarily a "good" parish. The Spanish-speakers in the last two weeks have been reluctant to recommend any clusters or mergers.
- Only one table suggested a cluster of St Ambrose + St Joseph the Worker primarily because they wanted all the parishes to retain their identities.
- Many did not understand the concept of a deanery and thought that had the deanery been
 meeting on a regular basis they could have supported each other and shared resources, or
 combined programs, sacramental prep, and other ministries. Everyone agreed they should
 meet on a regular basis for planning discussions and social gatherings like picnics. One
 person got up and suggested that deaneries should have met and held meetings before MAP
 scheduled the regional and deanery meetings.

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- The Spanish speaking table asked if the parishes would recover from COVID, what qualifies for closure, and what does the diocese suggest from their expert opinions?
- While we said that the financial data is only a small part of MAP's considerations, many in Deanery 5 believe that the financial data is weighted inappropriately or is considered the primary factor in any recommendations to cluster, merge or close. All the tables said they question the data, especially the financial data. Comments ranged from:
 - o using any data from 2021 because of the pandemic is inappropriate
 - o finances do not accurately reflect actual numbers
 - o their actual financial positions are better than the blended scores would indicate
 - o parameters for determining financial health too narrow
 - o parishes are in better financial shape than the diocese
- Fr Nick Glisson from St Mary Magdalen said that Deanery 5 has clergy resources from GTU and JST so there is not a priest shortage for them.
- Define the administration model for a cluster.
- How would deaneries be organized in this new model?
- Has the diocese learned from its mistakes?
- How did past parish mergers go? How was Mass attendance after the mergers? Do their combined administration, councils, and programs work effectively?
- Will their voices be heard and have decisions already been made?
- What is the timeline and plan and when will it be shared with the parishes?

- Utilize lay leadership more often such as Parish Life Directors, who have been used in the past.
- Utilize traveling or missionary priests to fill the gaps for the declining number of parish priests.
- Consider each parish's unique gifts that should not get lost in the rationalization by MAP and diocese.
- Cluster better than merger because it maintains each parish's identity and strengths and allows for parishioners to have more say in parish life.

- Factor distance between parishes when considering clusters.
- Consider infrastructure costs.
- Supply maps defining the parish boundaries and deaneries. Not sure current boundaries are appropriate.
- Closure is not an option but consider renting facilities to provide income.

Attendance:

- This is an average-sized deanery of five parishes. There were 39 registered, only 21 showed up but we added 18 new parishioners.
- Of the 39 people, only six from two parishes had attended the region 2 meeting (the lowest of all the deaneries) and two of those were the pastors/PAs from St Cornelius and St John the Baptist. This resulted in many questions about the Key Indicators and Supplemental Sacraments spreadsheets/data since so few had seen the spreadsheets or watched the orientation video when the columns and information were explained in more detail.
- There is one elementary school at St John the Baptist and the principal participated in this deanery meeting. Dr Andrew Currier from the school department also attended.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- This deanery has wide differences in attendance ranging from a low 5-year average at Our Lady of Mercy of 133 to a high at St Cornelius of 3,619 (St Mark = 1,799, St John the Baptist = 631, and St Jerome = 336).
- The deanery's total attendance in 2019 was 5,699 and 3,371 in 2021 or 59.2% of 2019 attendance.
- They have 24 Masses with 11 in languages other than English.
- This deanery has many financial challenges and all but one yellow parish (St John the Baptist) has red blended financial scores.
- One of the Spanish-speaking table reporters who was bi-lingual mentioned that many parishioners think the church and their parish is "rich," which means that they do not support the parish financially and do not support their priests enough.
- St John the Baptist has the only school rated WCEA "effective" with a yellow Tier 2 financial ranking.

Structural Collaborations:

- Of the six table groups, five English-speaking and one Spanish-speaking, four recommended clustering mostly based on geography and language. () indicates the number of tables suggesting a similar collaboration. One of the tables suggested that these clustered parishes should be financed or supported by the deanery.
- Cluster: St Mark + St Cornelius (3) including the Spanish-speaking table.
- Either cluster or merge St John + St Jerome (2).
- Our Lady of Mercy had opposite recommendations. One table said to close and another table said no closure but consider merging although no other parish was suggested. It was also suggested that it be kept open because it is a beautiful church for feast days or weddings or other celebrations.
- Due to the severe financial challenges in this deanery, there were also comments that sharing
 administrations may not work since these parishes do not have the money to pay staff even if
 they were combined.

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- What are the savings in clustering, merging or closing if the parishes are struggling financially?
- Consider the number of sacraments provided and the number of priests.
- How do we keep volunteers active and vibrant?
- Does it really matter what we say?

- Get parents more involved with their children and youth so they attend Mass often.
- Preserve the identity of each parish and community.
- Motivate the young people.
- Raise awareness of the economic and financial challenges.

Attendance:

- There are six parishes and St Paul had the largest number of participants. 18 of the 51 present attended the Region 2 meeting.
- With the exception of the pastor of St David of Wales, all of the pastors/PAs attended the deanery meeting.
- There are four elementary schools and three of the four principals attended. St Paul, San Pablo principal was absent.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- Three parishes have low 5-year average attendance: St Rose/St Patrick = 148, St David = 342 and St Callistus = 622. Their 2019 attendance respectively was 130, 384 and 537 and their 2021 attendance was 91, 350 and 369.
- The other 3 parishes in this deanery had high attendance: St Patrick, Rodeo = 1,436 (2019 =

- 1,341 and 2021 = 670), St Paul = 1,547 (1,362 and 2021 = 954) and St Joseph = 2,546 (2019 = 2,650 and 2021 = 1,295). The total deanery attendance in 2019 was 6,404 but dropped to 3,729 or 58.2% of 2019 counts.
- Financially, St Joseph's red blended score does not correspond to their high attendance counts while St David has both a red financial score and lower attendance. St Callistus, St Paul and St Rose/St Patrick are yellow and St Patrick, Rodeo is the only green parish.
- There are three parish and one Lumen Christi Academies (LC) elementary schools in Deanery 7.
 St Paul, part of LC, is rated "highly effective" with a red Tier 1 financial score. Of the parish schools, St David is rated "effective" with a yellow Tier 2 financial score while the other two schools are both green Tier 3 WCEA rated schools but with WCEA scores St Patrick "highly effective" and St Joseph "effective."

Structural Collaborations:

- Based on the six table groups that presented, they unanimously selected clusters.
- The groups shared strong negative feelings about closures and were also not open to mergers
 either. The biggest reason was because each parish believes in the importance of their own
 identity, and they would like to maintain this.
- The clustering they suggested is based on parish proximity to another so that the clergy would not have to drive too far. For example, St. Joseph, Pinole and St. Patrick, Rodeo are a 4-minute drive from each other so this was one of the suggestions.
- Four different clusters were suggested. () indicates the number of tables suggesting a similar collaboration:
 - St Patrick, Rodeo + St Joseph, Pinole + St Rose/St Patrick (4)
 - St Patrick, Rodeo + St Rose/St Patrick
 - St Paul + St David + St Callistus (4)
 - St David + St Callistus

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- Clusters are a prelude to closing.
- There is not enough data to make recommendations.
- Shouldn't we be looking into more virtual Masses?
- Why are we not talking about evangelization now?
- Shouldn't a member of the Office of Evangelization be present? (Fr. Anthony mentioned Fr. Jimmy and shared that he is a member of the MAP commission).
- Can we have another year or two to strengthen our parishes before moving into one of these options?
- There are fear and concern in other people's comments. We cannot respond with doom and gloom to this.

- Focus on catechesis and evangelization now.
- Define an approach and communicate with our parishioners which will be the key to how they respond.
- Communicate to parishioners what is happening because they are an important resource in this.

Attendance:

- There were 68 people registered, 21 absences and five adds for a total attendance of 52. Of those, 14 attended the Region 2 meeting.
- St Stephen is part of Deanery 8 with the other Walnut Creek parishes but is now administered by Christ the King and attended the Deanery 9 meeting.
- The pastor from St John Vianney did not attend the deanery or regional meetings. The other five pastors/PAs attended.
- There are two elementary schools and St Perpetua's principal attended and St Mary's sent a representative for the principal who had a scheduling conflict.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- This deanery has a wide spread of 5-year average attendance raging from two parishes under 500 (Santa Maria = 499 and St Anne = 469) to St Perpetua = 512 and St Monica = 742. With higher attendance are St John Vianney = 1,268 and St Mary = 1,572.
- The deanery's total attendance not counting St Stephen was 4,489 in 2019 and 2,756 in 2021 or 61.4% of 2019 attendance.

- One of the more predominant English-speaking deaneries, they have 29 Masses with only one Mass at St Mary's in Spanish.
- Financially, three of the parishes are ranked green (Santa Maria, St Monica and St Perpetua) and three are yellow (St Anne, St John Vianney and St Mary).
- They have two elementary schools at St Mary and St Perpetua both ranked "highly effective." St Mary is green Tier 3 and St Perpetua is yellow Tier 2.

Structural Collaborations:

Clustering was a popular model with Deanery 8, with almost every table suggesting pairings of parishes, and shying away from the other models as too drastic. () indicates the number of tables suggesting a similar collaboration:

- Cluster geographically (2):
 - Lamorinda parishes (Santa Maria + St Monica + St Perpetua)
 - Walnut Creek parishes (St Anne + St John Vianney + St Mary + St Stephan)
- Cluster:
 - St Perpetua + St Mary + St Anne
 - St Monica + St Stephan
- Consider combining the financially weak with the stronger parishes.

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- Look at why "team ministry" approaches have failed in the past especially when considering clusters or merger.
- Are we able to predict movement of populations especially post-COVID?
- Need more demographic data to inform cluster/merge decisions.
- How do we grow the church and get people to return to Mass and the church?
- This is a "band-aid" to the larger challenges.
- If more than one priest in a clustered parish, who will be in charge?

- Recognize geographical proximity of sites.
- Encourage more lay involvement in parishes.
- Engage and develop active lay leadership.
- Reduce Mass times in clusters.
- Combine administrative functions but over a period of several years.
- Think outside the box priests should be allowed to marry, women as priests.
- Share personnel.
- Review Mass times and the number of Masses.
- Consider volume purchasing to reduce costs.
- Find a way for parishes doing better financially to reach out to sister parishes that are struggling to offer some kind of support (maybe not financial but management).

- All the pastors/PAs attended the deanery meeting as did several other priests and deacons.
- Of those present, 42 had attended the Region 3 meeting.
- This deanery has five elementary schools: three parish schools and two part of Lumen Christi Academies (ED Rodney Pierre-Antoine attended) and two of the three school principals attended and one sent a proxy in her absence. Only one parish, St Bonaventure, does not have a school.
- Giles Miller from Mission Advancement and Brad Mohler from Department of Catholic Schools also attended.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- This deanery, with the exception of St Catherine of Siena, has large Mass attendance counts with four of the parishes having 2019 and 5-year average counts over 2,200.
- Queen of All Saints had the highest 5-yr average of 2,832 and St Catherine the lowest at 701 (St Stephen was very low at 203).
- Deanery 9's seven parishes, now including St Stephen, have total 5-year average attendance of 11,883, total 2019 attendance of 11,213 with attendance of 6,978 in 2021, which is 62.2% of 2019 attendance.
- Including St Stephen who holds 2 English-speaking Masses, they have 42 Masses with 10 being held in a language other than English.
- Financially, Queen of All Saints and St Agnes have green blended financial scores, with the other parishes scoring yellow (St Stephen scored red).
- All five schools are WCEA rated "highly effective" with green Tier 3 financial scores for all but St Catherine of Siena which is red Tier 1.

Structural Collaborations:

Of the eight table groups, five suggested similar cluster or merger "possibilities" even with parishes in contiguous deaneries because of proximity or language. () indicates the number of tables suggesting a similar collaboration:

- St Catherine of Siena + St Rose/St Patrick in Deanery 7 (4)
- St Catherine of Siena + Christ the King/St Stephen (2)
- St Catherine of Siena + Queen of All Saints (1)
- St Agnes + St Bonaventure (3)
- Queen of All Saints + St Peter Martyr in Deanery 10 (3)
- Christ the King + St Stephen (already done)

- Consolidate and better coordinate Mass times and advertise all the deanery's Mass times on each parish's websites; rotating Mass times and all the deanery's priests within the deanery especially those in close proximity.
- Rotate priests through all the parishes to make all the deanery's parishioners more comfortable with all the priests.
- Centralize or rotate annually the parish cultural celebrations such as Simbang Gabi instead of holding one at each of the parishes which creates more work, time and expense for priests and volunteers.
- Re-align deanery boundaries based on parish similarities and geography.
- Create *Centers of Excellence* models at various parishes for specific ministries, formation, pastoral care, and spiritual direction so all the parishes can benefit and utilize each specific center.
- Cluster rectory spaces for potential savings and possible rental income.
- Have the deanery meet frequently and communicate with reps from each parish to provide an ongoing structure to the collaboration models.
- Create a deanery "master calendar" that is shared with all the parishes in the deanery.
- Coordinate and consolidate all formation programs and requirements, fees for sacraments, etc. to discourage "parish shopping" and encourage full deanery collaboration and cooperation.

- Free priests from administrative duties.
- Share best practices in the deanery and diocese.
- Move Confirmation from high school to middle-school.
- Create a 4th model:
 - Conduct a needs assessment at every parish to identify strengths and weaknesses so resources can be shared to avoid duplicating efforts.
 - o Have the vocation director visit all the parishes regularly to encourage vocations.

Attendance:

- This was our largest deanery meeting with 72 attendees, including 17 adds or people who were not registered. Of those present, 32 had attended the Region 3 meeting.
- The pastor from St Anne did not attend but the other pastors/PAs were present and

- actively participated with their parishioners.
- There are two elementary schools, Most Holy Rosary and St Peter Martyr (Lumen Christi Academies), and both principals attended. Dr Andrew Currier from the school department also attended.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- This is the largest deanery with eight parishes. They also have the 2nd highest total deanery attendance after Deanery 13.
- This deanery had total 5-year average attendance of 15,037, 2019 count was 14,359 which dropped to 9,059 in 2021 or 63.1% of 2019 counts.
- Deanery 10 has a wide range of attendance counts ranging from a 5-yr average low of 636 at St Ignatius, Antioch to a high of 3,368 at IHM in Brentwood.
- Even their 2021 attendance was stronger with only St Anne (492) and St Ignatius (404) having attendance under 500.
- Financially, four parishes are green (IHM, Our Lady Queen of the World, St Anthony and St Ignatius), one yellow (Most Holy Rosary) and three red (Good Shepherd, St Anne and St Peter Martyr).
- Their two schools have yellow Tier 2 financial scores. St Peter Martyr is ranked "highly effective" while Most Holy Rosary is ranked "effective" from WCEA.

Structural Collaborations:

Of the eight table groups, seven English-speaking and one Spanish-speaking, they all avoided identifying any specific clusters or mergers of parishes although they felt clusters were preferred to maintain identities, if action was required. They did suggest:

- Clusters could be considered for churches in the same city as long as they maintain their identities.
- No closures because area is growing.
- Recommended collaboration models to merge programs or cluster human and financial resources, with one table saying that deanery shared resources should be the goal to avoid taking any other action.
- Clusters would require strong administrative leaders and supporting councils including more use
 of deacons and parish life directors which would allow priests to focus on spiritual needs and
 sacraments.
- Clustering would unify communities allowing for one voice, consistent guidelines, and less parishioner shopping.

Primary concerns and questions:

- Not enough information to formulate recommendations.
- Consider clustering over time; move in stages to prepare parishioners.
- Some parishioners and attendees not up to speed about MAP.
- Translate all handouts into Spanish.

Ideas and recommendations:

- Provide support groups for priests to administer new clusters.
- Educate, form, and encourage lay leaders.
- Help parishes prepare for any transitions.
- Consider restructuring the parishes first.
- Pay attention to cultural diversity and language differences when MAP makes recommendations.
- Look at reducing number of Masses in the deanery.
- Share resources in the deanery
- Combine sacramental preparation and celebrations.
- Evangelize.
- Broaden the vision of the church.
- Evaluate buildings and their uses and consider renting spaces.

- Of the 46 present, there were five added and 33 attended the Region 4 meeting.
- The pastor from CCoP was the only pastor/PA who did not attend the meeting.
- There are three elementary schools and the principal from St Michael participated with her parish; the other two principals were absent.
- Giles Miller from Mission Advancement attended the meeting.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- Mass attendance is strong with five of the six parishes having 5-year attendance over 2,000.
- CCoP, with two worship sites, had the highest 5-year average attendance of 3,067, although it dropped to 2,777 in 2019 and to 1,154 in 2021 or 41.6% of 2019 counts.
- St Charles is the smallest parish with 5-year average attendance of 910, 2019 attendance of 846 and 2021 attendance of 528 or 62.4% of 2019 attendance, which is the highest 2021 comparison percentage for the six parishes in Deanery 11.
- Total deanery 5-year average attendance was 13,115 and was 11,588 in 2019 and 6,169 in 2021 or 53.2% of 2019 attendance.
- They have 37 Masses with three in languages other than English (St Michael = 2 and St Raymond = 1).
- Financially, only St Charles has a yellow blended financial score while the other five, larger parishes have green financial scores.
- There are three elementary schools at St Isidore, St Michael, and St Raymond, all rated "highly effective" with St Isidore green Tier 3 and St Michael and St Raymond yellow Tier 2 in the financial rankings.

Structural Collaborations:

As expected, with generally healthy or vibrant parishes as part of this deanery, only one of the five tables suggested possible geographical or cultural clusters. Most suggested other collaboration models.

- Geographical:
 - St Isidore + St Joan of Arc
 - St Charles + St Michael
 - CCoP + St Raymond
- Cultural:
 - CCoP + St Charles (similar liturgies, music and as experiment for Divine Renovation and Growing Disciples)
 - CCoP + St Raymond (growing Hispanic populations to increase participation)
- Close or merge smaller parishes to enhance and grow the larger parishes.

- Prepare thoroughly and properly all the parish communities for new configurations.
- Cluster and share ministries: faith formation, youth programs, grief, divorce, and young adults.
- Cluster based on existing relationships, facilities, Mass times and similar demographics.
- Reduce Mass times to fill the churches to have a vibrant "Sunday experience."
- Create sister parish relationships within the Diocese; adopt a sister parish who might be struggling.
- Share business managers or operations directors which will create full time positions with benefits

and share salary expenses among parishes.

- Consider having Parish Life Directors or lay administrators instead of pastors.
- Create a deanery mission or goal and apply it with centralized deanery communications and calendar to keep everyone informed and aware of what is offered at which parish in the deanery.

Attendance:

- This deanery has six parishes. There were 12 added attendees and of those present, 20 attended the Region 4 meeting. Fr Sales mentioned that he had fewer people from Holy Spirit because there was an outbreak of COVID.
- All of the pastors/PAs were present.
- This deanery has four elementary schools and all the principals were present. Jocelyn Pierre Antoine from Department of Catholic Schools commented that they have an active "root," meet often, and collaborate well.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- This deanery has high 5-yr average and 2019 Mass attendance counts ranging from a low 5-yr average of 818 at Corpus Christi to a high of 3,723 at Holy Spirit with two over 1,100 and two over 2,000.
- The deanery's 5-yr average attendance as 11,459, 2019 was 10,831 and 2021 was 6,041, which is 55.8% of 2019 attendance.
- They have 36 Masses with eight of those in languages other than English at 4 of the six parishes (Holy Spirit and St James only offer Masses in English).
- Their blended financial scores have two parishes (Corpus Christi and Our Lady of Guadalupe) in red and the other four in green.
- School rankings vary. Holy Spirit is green Tier 3 financially but "effective" in its WCEA score. St Joseph school is both "highly effective" and green Tier 3, while Our Lady of Guadalupe and St Edward are yellow Tier 2 with WCEA ratings of "highly effective."

Structural Collaborations:

- Of the six table groups, the common thread was clusters were better than mergers. It was important to these parishes to keep their identities.
- After a lengthy discussion with Fr Brandon who provided more context, one table suggested that mergers may make a parish stronger even though the transition may take time and be difficult based on Our Lady of Guadalupe's experience.
- Another table suggested clustering Corpus Christi + St Joseph.
- Any structural collaborations should consider:
 - Distance and geography
 - Culture and language
 - Finances
 - Leadership (lay and clergy, which must be strong)
- One table listed the pros and cons for each of the three models without making any recommendations.
 - Mergers would mean parishes lose their identity, cause parishioners to leave and create fewer personal connections and a sense of belonging. On the positive side, they stated that mergers would lower overhead costs and staff, improve financials, generate more income from renting unused space/buildings, possibly build community, relieve the pressures due to lack of priests and infuse fresh people and energy.
 - Clustering would keep the identity and charism of each parish, protect legacy sacraments, create cost savings by having one administration and one priest, however, there would be more work for the assigned clergy, it might just be a band-aid and not a long term solution, and lower parish/parishioner engagement and commitment.
 - Closure would save money and generate more revenue and better use human and financial resources but would result in fewer worship spaces, lose identity and create sadness among parishioners.

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- The deanery has failed and there has not been any collaboration even before the pandemic. It should be better utilized, including communication among parishes.
- Merging different cultures can create divisions.

- Financial blended scores may not accurately reflect if a parish is really doing well or not.
- Sharing a priest with another parish and maintaining a cluster may be difficult.

Ideas and Recommendations:

- Redistributing resources: human, students, financial, clergy, administration and formation and sacramental programs would be beneficial to deanery and parishes.
- Reduce the number of Masses in the deanery.
- Consolidate the Spanish Masses.
- Engage the youth and re-evangelize the whole parish community.
- Adopt in the deanery and diocese the Amazing Parish and Divine Renovation models.

MAP Attendance for Administrative Support: Fr Jimmy Macalinao, Mary Fair and Amanda Wehrman

Attendance:

- This deanery has seven parishes. Of the 57 present, 35 had attended the Region 5 meeting.
- Pastor from St Bede was absent but all the other pastors/PAs attended.
- This deanery has five elementary schools, four of the principals attended. A S ' c al was absent.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- This deanery had the highest 5-yr average and 2019 Mass attendance and second highest 2021 attendance of all 14 deaneries.
- Their 5-yr average was 17,165, 2019 = 16,128 and 2021 = 8,019, which is 50.2% of their 2019 attendance.
- These high attendance counts and sacramental numbers were mentioned often, suggesting in the table reports that the strong key indicators were in their favor to avoid the proposed models.
- They have 44 Masses with 13 of those in languages other than English.
- Financially, two of the parishes are in the green (St Anne and St John the Baptist), three are yellow (All Saints, St Bede and St Joachim) and two are in the red (Our Lady of the Rosary and St Clement).
- Four of the deanery's five schools are rated WCEA "highly effective" (All Saints, St Bede, St Clement, and St Joachim) and St John the Baptist is "somewhat effective." They have four financial benchmarks of green Tier 3 with All Saints ranked red Tier 1.

Structural Collaborations:

Of the eight table groups, they all suggested clustering as their best suggested option because it allowed the parishes to retain their identities and schools and remain independent.

- There was a common thread that a cluster is the short term solution to better prepare parishioners to get used to working together with a merger being a future, longer-term solution, if necessary. Clusters may also help parishes struggling financially.
- One table did propose some possible clusters with the pastors traveling among these clusters:
 - St Bede + St Clement (pastor retiring soon, location and connection to Moreau HS)
 - All Saints + St Clement (location)
 - St Anne + Our Lady of the Rosary (Union City locations)
 - Our Lady of the Rosary, Union City + Corpus Christi, Fremont (proximity of churches)
- There were some definitions of how to cluster:
 - Geographically by city (St John the Baptist + St Joachim)
 - Demographically (All Saints + St John the Baptist + St Joachim)
 - Financially with a stronger parish clustering with a struggling parish.
 - O Another table suggested a cluster outside of the deanery without naming parishes.

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- How cluster with one parish in the deanery managed by a religious order?
- Mergers or clusters will reduce the number of staff which will not help with evangelization.
- Mergers are not an option.

Ideas and Recommendations:

- "Buy more, save more" to purchase supplies in bulk centrally for the deanery.
- Collaborate, create better coordination and consistency and less competition for YM, RE/faith formation, other sacramental programs and even among some lay ministries.
- Combine custodial and landscaping services or staff.
- Rotate or consolidate daily Masses during the week.
- Recruit priests from other countries.
- Share best practices and the wealth and knowledge across the diocese.
- Utilize, train, and develop lay leadership to relieve priests of administrative duties.
- Consider the workload for already overburdened staff in clusters or mergers.
- Evaluate the value of the properties.
- Consider collaborations outside the deanery.

Attendance:

- Deanery 14 has six parishes in Castro Valley and San Leandro.
- 51 were registered with 18 absent and seven adds. Of those present, 19 had attended the Region 5 meeting.
- Our Lady of Grace, managed by OFM Conv., was the only parish not represented by their pastor because OLG had emailed that the three priests would be attending their provincial meeting that evening.
- From the four elementary schools, St Felicitas sent the only principal who attended the meeting.

Mass Attendance and Finances:

- Their 5-yr average Mass attendance ranges from a low of 537 at Our Lady of Good Counsel to a high of 3,051 at St Leander. St Felicitas also has high average attendance of 2,228, while the other three parishes have attendance under 900 (Transfiguration = 868, Our Lady of Grace = 755, and Assumption = 610).
- The deanery's total 5-year average attendance was 8,049. Attendance in 2019 was 7,615 and in 2021 was 4,415 or 58% of 2019 counts.
- Financially, three parishes are green (Assumption, Our Lady of Grace and St Leander) and three are yellow (Our Lady of Good Counsel, St Felicitas and Transfiguration). In their table discussions, they all remarked that they are doing well.
- This deanery has four parishes in San Leandro, three with schools, and two parishes in Castro Valley, one with a school. All the schools are WCEA rated "highly effective" and two are green Tier 3 (Our Lady of Grace and St Felicitas) and two are yellow Tier 2 (Assumption and St Leander).

Structural Collaborations:

Like other "healthier" deaneries, they did not make any specific cluster or merger recommendations.

- Of the six table groups, the overall impression was not to change anything or if required, cluster over time to see how the model works before considering closing any parishes.
- Two of the tables actually suggested pros and cons for each collaboration model:
 - Clusters would be positive because they would be easier for parishioners to accept, parishes can combine programs and sacraments to make them stronger and more vibrant, create more successful parishes, combine staff, and create more full time positions with benefits vs several parishes hiring part-time staff, utilize a centralized tech person and communications director for better PR to promote clustered parishes and evangelize. The cons are that the number of Masses will be reduced, priests will be overloaded and not as attentive to a parish's needs, and the buildings will be the same with no savings on upkeep.
 - Mergers would reduce some building upkeep expenses, may prove over time that one or more "weaker" parishes should be closed and may be easier to accept vs. parishes losing their identity, everyone overloaded with duties, and difficulties sharing human, financial and program resources.
 - Closures would increase income from rentals of unused facilities but would be more difficult for parishioners to accept, cause parishioners to leave and lose property with no room for growth.

Primary Concerns and Questions:

- What will happen to the schools if there are clusters or mergers?
- What is the need to cluster, merge or close with the strong status of our parishes?
- Need more input to make any decisions and more sacramental data about funerals, registered families and some of the ratios would be helpful.
- It would be helpful to know the demographics, projections, or future trends for their area. (Responded about MissionInsite tools and that it will be made available to parish leadership in the future).
- What will be the timing for any action?
- What is the rubric for a cluster vs. a merger vs. a closure?
- Meetings about state of diocese should continue to be held and allowing for open dialogue and suggestions.

- Share on an on-going and updated basis the Mass attendance, financial, sacraments and other data that would be helpful to keep the parishes informed and allow them to plan better.
- Reduce the number of Masses and consider clustering Mass times geographically or staggering the Mass times at each of the parishes.
- Consider some hybrid models for the key parish staffing positions: Liturgy, faith formation, First Communion, Confirmation, RCIA and office managers.
- Share best practices.
- Consider what will attract and keep young families in the church.
